Welcome from the president

I am pleased to be the newly elected President of the Athabasca University Students' Union and to have such a strong and energetic student council. The new council is focused on revitalizing the union with several new initiatives and plans to enhance services and provide additional value to our membership. Council considers 2005 a year of change and of rebuilding the association. Other initiatives include reworking the scholarship/award program, policy updates,



and website upgrades. I would like to take this opportunity to touch on a number of past and current initiatives underway at the union and to provide some additional insight into current activities and news affecting AUSU and our membership.

This year saw five new members elected to the student council in the March elections. I would like to thank our outgoing President, Debbie Jabbour, and Vice-President, Shirley Barg, for their dedication to the organization and membership. I would also like to thank our past council members for their time and effort while serving on council.

In the past year, projects completed by the previous council included installing an online election system that was used successfully in the spring election. A new mentor program was also introduced for our members, and several new student clubs were formed. AUSU and Athabasca University collaborated on a new Student Handbook this year, and AUSU donated money to AU's Access to Students with Disabilities department to assist our disabled members. Student awards totaling \$29,000 were provided to our members.

AUSU councillors were also externally active in promoting student concerns. Shirley Barg chaired the Council of Alberta University Students (CAUS) and actively participated in raising student awareness of tuition increases made possible by the introduction of Alberta's Bill 43. Council members were also active on several university committees promoting student interests and concerns.



With less than a month on council, the new representatives got their first test of group cohesiveness with the highly publicized news release of Alberta Premier Ralph Klein's academic paper. Issues of plagiarism surrounding Mr. Klein's paper had the media asking for interviews. Council took to the challenge and handled the situation admirably while defending AU's integrity.

The newly elected council members participated in the 2004 AU Convocation by providing an AUSU sponsored luncheon for the graduands. Each grad received a commemorative clock from the union, and AUSU also presented gifts to the honourary degree recipients.

Currently, council members are active in reworking the AUSU scholarship program. The marketing committee is in the process of examining the website, to ensure that it remains valid and useful for our members.

The initiatives of the past year could not have been achieved without the dedication and hard work of my cohorts. I would like to again thank the previous executive members, Debbie Jabbour, Shirley Barg, and Sandra Moore. I would also like to thank our previous council who triumphed in making council a challenging and rewarding experience. To my new council members — Lisa Priebe, Cindy Stobbe, Joy Krys, Shannon Maguire, and Lonita Fraser — I look forward to working with you to make distance education a positive experience for all our members. Karl Low and Teresa Neuman round out the new executive. Their relentless enthusiasm makes the challenges we face into positive experiences. Tamra Ross Low is our Voice editor and Communications Coordinator, whose professionalism is unparalleled. Christine Lynch, our administrative assistant, displays an unremitting loyalty to AUSU that is greatly appreciated. Many thanks to all of you. Without your commitment to the Union and our members our initiatives would not be the success that they are.

Every AU student is a member of AUSU. Together we are a collective voice of over 30,000 students at the University. As an autonomous, democratic organization we are dedicated to advancing students' interests and member services, and achieving a high quality educational system that is accessible for all. Committee Involvement: As President of AUSU, I sit on all AUSU committees and chair several. I also sit on the AU Appeals and Awards committees and the AU Governing Council (AUGC) as a student representative.

Special Projects: In the last six months I have been involved in working on the AUSU Student Handbook/Planner, which is a collaborative project involving Athabasca University. The Student Handbook Committee is in the process of starting a new handbook for January 2004 distribution.

Activities: During the last year I have been active on several committees. In addition to my extensive work on the student handbook, I was involved with the Finance Committee working on developing the budget for this year.

In addition to my regular council duties I have been active on two Athabasca University committees. I sit on the awards committee, which is the committee responsible for awarding money to nominated students, tutors, and support staff, and the student appeals committee, which I have been involved with for the past year. This committee hears appeals from students regarding issues involving grades, plagiarism, and cheating. My role on this committee is as student representative.

Finally, this past year I was elected President of the Students' Union. In this new position I am responsible for overseeing all AUSU activities. This includes, but is not limited to, overseeing the revamping of awards offered by the union and the reworking of the website which will be online in the near future. A revision of the Student Handbook is also under way, and I was recently appointed to Athabasca University Governing Council as the student representive.

Plans for the coming year: One of my goals as a councillor is to raise the profile of AUSU among students as well as external stakeholders. I would like to actively increase services to students and ensure students' needs are met in a timely and efficient manner. Committee Involvement: External (chair), Newsletter (chair), Personnel, Student Planner.

Activities: As part of the role of VP External, I represent AUSU members on the Council of Alberta University Students (CAUS). Members who live in Alberta can expect to hear more about CAUS during the expected provincial election as post-secondary education and its issues will be front and centre during the campaign.

I was a guest at the June meeting of the Canadian Federation of Students and was impressed by the solidarity and collective power garnered by its members. At the meeting, I was reminded that debt is a huge obstacle that keeps many students from accessing post-secondary education. The newsletter committee plans to examine student debt and its effects on our members in the September issue of our newsletter, *AUSU News*.

Council is about serving our members. Included in my duties are regular meetings of the Executive and Council where we work to improve our services and access to them for members. I also attend meetings of the Ottawa coffee group and enjoy meeting AUSU members who live in the Ottawa area.

Plans for the coming year: The pending Alberta election means that post-secondary issues must remain in the public eye. AUSU will continue to be involved with CAUS, where along with election issues, CAUS continues to work for increased funding for students and for decreased student debt. The students' union has been a great resource for me and an important part of my AU experience. To meet the needs of members down the road, council needs to undertake some long-range strategic planning. This will ensure that the programs and services our members want and need will be developed and delivered effectively for future members.

Comment on council: I was thrilled to be re-elected to council and to be elected Vice-President External. vp finance report

Committee Involvement: Finance (Chair), Executive, Legislative, Personnel (non-voting), Convocation, AU Academic Council Representative for AUSU

Special Projects: Council anti-virus control, financial policy re-write.

Activities: During the last year I have been involved in a number of council activities in addition to my regular council duties. As the Legislative Committee chair, I worked to finally successfully revise the AUSU Bylaws to be more reflective of the special needs and requirements of a distance education students' union, and to give members more means to direct AUSU activities.

When the previous VPFA resigned, I was appointed to the position and began by completing the revisions to the AUSU financial policies with the help of the Finance Committee. These revisions provide for more accountability to AUSU members while at the same time keeping operations flowing smoothly and addressing concerns raised during the annual audit. This was followed by preparing a more realistic AUSU budget for the current year, which required council to make some hard decisions about which projects should receive priority.

In addition to the regular duties of the VPFA (monitoring expenses, dealing with accounts and administrative activities) I have also instituted the practice of preparing a monthly statement of AUSU's financial activities, which is submitted at a regular council meeting during the following month. This initiative addresses a long-standing complaint of both myself and other members of council of not knowing where we stand financially.

Most recently, I obtained permission from AU to provide AUSU council and staff with access to Athabasca University's anti-virus licensing program — a move that should save AUSU a few hundred dollars per year while ensuring that no councillor or staff member is at risk of contracting and spreading a computer virus to our members.

Plans for the coming year: I will be examining various investment areas to ensure that AUSU's savings are making the maximum return while providing the desired level of flexibility. In addition, I intend to examine various means for people to be able to provide payment to AUSU so that we have the ability to provide merchandise and other fund-raising activities for our members.

Comment on council: Over the past year, council has taken a number of steps to sort out its own internal operations. In the ten years we've been operating we've found some of the unique challenges and opportunities that operating at a distance provides. Member apathy, strong with any student union, is an even more significant challenge when there is no campus to promote your activities or even to hold them in. We've found ways to operate that work at a distance and are becoming, like our members, more diverse in our places of origin and residence. This will present additional challenges in the future.

financial report

- Over 2002/2003 AUSU created an operational surplus of just over \$100,000. Revenue was up and expenses were down.
- The increase in revenue is due to an increase in AU students and AUSU
 membership fees of over 10%. This was also partially responsible for the
 significant rise in the costs of the annual AUSU newsletter, as it contained more
 content and needed to be delivered to more students.
- A significant savings was found in election expenses as the year was not an
 election period for AUSU. Future election expenses should be significantly lower
 as we have now moved to a primarily online system for elections.
- Similarly, staff expenses dropped due primarily to maternity leave for our senior staff and the lower cost for her temporary replacement.
- There was also a significant savings in website expenses as many of the one time set-up costs were encompassed in the previous year of operations. This was somewhat offset by a significant increase in contract services to maintain and keep the website updated.
- Professional Fees saw a slight reduction due to moving the day to day accounting duties in house.
- Overall a good year for AUSU which allowed AUSU considerable latitude in attempting new programs to benefit members.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS SEPTEMBER 30, 2003

PURPOSE OF THE ASSOCIATION:

The objectives of the Association shall be to provide for the administration of the affairs of Athabasca University students including:

- a) the development and management of student institutions;
- b) the development and implementation of a system of student governing principles;
- the promotion of the general welfare of Athabasca University students;
- d) the furtherance of the values inherent in an open University as well as of life long learning.

2. ACCOUNTING POLICES:

These financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Canadian generally accepted accounting principles. The significant policies are as follows:

Revenue recognition:

Student fee revenue is recognized in the year to which the fees relate. Revenue from special activities is recognized when the function to which the revenue relates to has been presented or completed.

Donated services:

The work of the Association is dependent on the voluntary service of many individuals. Since these services are not normally purchased by the Association and because of the difficulty of determining their fair value, donated services are not recognized in these financial statements.

Equipment.

Equipment is stated at cost. Amortization is provided using the declining balance method at the following annual rates:

Office	20%
Computer	30%

Equipment donated to the Association is recorded at its estimated fair market value. No equipment was donated in 2003 or 2002.

2. ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED):

Cash and cash equivalents:

Cash and cash equivalents consist of balances with banks and short-term investments with maturities not exceeding 90 days.

Use of estimates:

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with Canadian generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenue and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

New AUSU council sworn in late March, 2004

All outgoing and incoming council members attended a full day teleconference changeover meeting, which included attendees from across Canada, and one in China. This is the first time that such an extensive changeover meeting was held, to assure that new council members had as much information as possible on the workings of council over the previous two-year term.

Conference Attendance

Council funded an AUSU student to attend a program-relevant conference.

AUSU.org

Significant updates to the AUSU.org user account system greatly enhanced usability and access to the secure areas of the site. The double login, once required for access to both AUSU.org secure pages and the AUSU forums system, was eliminated by a new account system that integrates the main website accounts with the accounts for the new forums and chat system.

The old AUSU forums were abandoned in favour of a new system (PHP-BB), which has proved very popular. While the previous forums were housed and maintained by an external company, the new forums system is contained within AUSU webspace and maintained by the AUSU webmaster, allowing quicker response times to account problems, and greater customization of the forum interface.

New AUSU chatroom allows user profiles with pictures and multiple rooms. Chat system "plugs-in" to the forum system, allowing integrated accounts; New login system allows users to check a box to have the system "remember"

AUSU.org will run a large user survey to collect information on AUSU members and their needs. This information will be used to improve AUSU services and target those services to our ever changing membership

AUSU Mentor Program

The Mentor Program launced in early 2004. This program pairs experienced AU students with new students, for the purpose of providing newcomers with someone to assist them in making the most of AU and distance education

The number of students volunteering to mentor new students has been high, and a database of available mentors is kept in the AUSU office

Requests for mentors have been few, but mentors are available for any new student who feels they would like some extra support and advice in their first few months at AU

Study Buddy Program

The program has served a large number of students since its inception in late 1996, and continues to be a very popular program of AU

The on-line list, where students are able to select a study buddy of their choice, makes the matching process much quicker and easier. Students who do not find a suitable Study Buddy listed can add their own name so that they may be contacted when someone else in their course is seeking a Study Buddy

This system makes it much more likely that students will find a Study Buddy, as everyone who is listed is interested in the program, whereas the old system used names off the student directory and there was no guarantee that those on the directory wanted to participate in the program

Student Handbook/Planner

The AUSU Student Handbook/Planner was reintroduced this year as a trial project which paired AUSU with AU to combine the AUSU publication with the AU Student Handbook. This publication was reasonably well received, but continuing this project is not financially feasible at this time

The 2005 AUSU Student Handbook/Planner is underway. An agreement has been struck with a Canadian advertizing firm to obtain ads for the publication and offset printing and mailing costs. The new handbook will seek to include all of the features that students liked about the previous publications in a somewhat smaller and more portable format.

Councillor's Report Lonita Fraser

Activities: During my time on council I have contributed to council run committees in addition to those that I am a member of and chair. I have been present at all council meetings to date, and participated in all votes and discussions, both via meetings and through email discussion. Councillor's Report Joy Krys

Special Projects: AUSU website research; AUSU promotional projects, and a Student Communication project (initiating)

Activities: My six months with council have been such a fresh experience! My previous degree is from China where the education and students' unions system are quite different, so I am gorging with knowledge about council policies and issues. I'm also glad to contribute my limited yet passionate experience toward the Marketing Committee's goal of increasing AUSU awareness, and ensuring our services are being used.

Plans for the coming year: As I return to Edmonton, I hope council makes good use of my availability to help with events in the Edmonton Learning Centre. Lack of communication is a disadvantage of distance learning. I want to take a lead in creating and developing student communication in every possible way. My proposal for a Student Communication Project is forthcoming.

Comment on council: I was surprised that AUSU has such expansive and systematic by-laws and policies, and works so professionally. The new website is wonderful, and the user-friendly forums have attracted more users, which means AUSU services are better accepted. Although AUSU is doing great work, too few students use our services due to 1) low awareness of AUSU and 2) the assumption that distance universities don't have students' unions.

Councillor's Report Shannon Maguire

Special Projects: Proposed and created new Marketing & Public Relations Committee (MPRC)

Activities: As soon as I was elected to council I became chair of the Convocation Committee, which was responsible for planning and organizing AUSU's contribution to the 2004 Convocation. After convocation, I proposed and created the MPRC which is responsible for marketing, raising student awareness of AUSU and its programs and services, and informing students about AUSU activities, services, resources and positions on current events and issues. The committee has created its terms of reference and is conducting research to determine how to improve AUSU.org and ensure students are aware of all that we have to offer. It also recently evaluated AUSU's marketing situation which is the first step in creating a new marketing plan. Special Projects: Scholarship & Awards program


